Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Oral Health care Quality among Children Enrolled in Medicaid and CHIP

Study Findings

- More than 2/3 of state Medicaid programs had missing data on race and ethnicity >10%.
- Compared with the reference group of non-Hispanic white children, scores on quality measures of access and prevention were generally
 - **lower** for non-Hispanic black and American Indian/Alaskan Native children
 - **higher** for non-Hispanic Asian and Hispanic children
 - **mixed** for Hawaiian/Pacific Islander children
- Patterns in disparities varied across states.

Key Takeaways

- A critical (necessary but not sufficient) step in improving health equity is building the data collection and reporting infrastructure to identify disparities, set health equity goals, and monitor progress toward those goals.
- Each program should evaluate disparities within the context of the specific populations served in order to most effectively advance health equity.

Anti-Racism Structures in Academic Dentistry: Supporting Underrepresented Racially/Ethnically Diverse Faculty

ANTIRACISM FRAMEWORK: DENTAL EDUCATION

- Acknowledge the historical foundations of racism and its existence today and assess institutional readiness to take action and provide sustainable and meaningful change
- Train students, faculty, staff, residents, fellows, and stakeholders on antiracism, structural competency, implicit bias, cognitive errors, emotional & cultural tax, the cultural competence continuum, stereotype threat, health equity, imposter syndrome, traumainformed approaches, and belonging
- Confirm commitment to antiracism through active listening, internal & external data review, research, engagement, allocation of resources, and strategic planning
- Engage diverse internal and external leaders, experts, and stakeholders to lead antiracism strategic initiatives
- Identify policies, practices, and ways in which systemic and structural racism manifest to adopt new transformative initiatives to disrupt and change the status quo
- Evaluate the climate along with existing and new policies, programs, and practices through an antiracism lens, develop strategic initiatives to remove racialized barriers, and monitor strategies for continuous improvement



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Roundtable Discussion



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Oral health and overall health are inextricably linked. There is mounting evidence to suggest that poor oral health is related to a <u>variety of chronic health conditions</u>, such as high blood pressure, dementia, diabetes, and obesity. Despite this known connection, dental care is still largely siloed from medical care. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that integrating basic health screenings into a dental setting could save the health care system up to \$100 million every year.¹

CareQuest Institute for Oral Health conducted a nationally representative survey in January and February 2021 to assess consumers' perspectives on oral and overall health (n=5320). CareQuest Institute also conducted a nationwide survey of oral health providers to assess perspectives and current behaviors related to interprofessional practice (n=377). Consumers and oral health providers described a lack of integration between medical and oral health care, and a desire for increased interprofessional collaboration.

Key Findings: Medical-dental collaboration is currently uncommon.


